Economic Impact of Uber Eats



Uber Eats asked NZIER to assess its economic contribution, and the contribution of Ready to Eat (RTE) services.

After accounting for all the benefits to businesses across New Zealand and the consumer welfare gains, NZIER estimates suggest that Uber Eats increases the size of the New Zealand economy by \$162 million per year. Relative to annual GDP in the restaurant sector, this represents 3.4% of that.





This improved matching of needs between participating restaurants and customers results in efficiency gains for both parties.

For example, customers can put the time saved from not having to shop for and prepare meals towards more enjoyable activities. NZIER estimates that in 2019, Uber Eats services improved New Zealanders' wellbeing by \$4 million from less time spent travelling and \$30 million from food preparation time savings.

Participating restaurants can also benefit as it allows them, for example, to focus on preparing meals and leave the marketing of its offering to Uber Eats. Restaurants can also choose if they use their own delivery fleet or link with delivery partners accessing the Uber Eats app for flexible earning opportunities.

At a high-level, the RTE services lead to:

- An increase in demand for restaurant orders
- Higher economic activity for the Uber Eats delivery partners in the transport sector
- An increase in the size of the financial services sector
- A shift in activity from households' grocery shopping to wholesale grocery shopping by the restaurants.

NZIER also found there were wellbeing gains for customers who spent less time travelling to pick up food, preparing their meals and cleaning up the dishes. Additional employment generated by RTE services total 517 new jobs across New Zealand with Auckland, Wellington and Waikato benefiting most.
